

The following might be of interest for your newsletter. Yesterday, I heard on the news that NASA's Juno probe was about to enter into orbit around Jupiter, after a 5-year journey (it did it successfully). They mentioned we could get more info on the following website: Eyes on Juno

From this site, you can download and install an app (it is safe – just run it from NASA's site and follow the instructions). When you open this app, you choose the mission that interests you (e.g. Juno Mission) and it shows you all about this mission in animated graphics with a bit of explanatory text: the journey, the science, the spacecraft. It also tells you in real time the current distance from Juno to Jupiter and its velocity. The orbit is highly elliptical. Quite fascinating for anyone with an interest in science and/or engineering.

As I read through the various scientific instruments on Juno, I saw that some came from countries other than the US, but not from Canada. Since Canada often contributes to other Space Agencies' missions, I went on the Canadian Space Agency (CSA) web site, and effectively I did not find anything about Juno. However I did find that CSA had launched a new satellite of its own just 2 weeks ago (June 21) called Maritime Monitoring and Messaging Microsatellite (M3MSat). It is described in the following link. Sailors, Big Brother is watching you!
