Bonard's Story

After graduation, I did flight training on the Chipmunk, Harvard, and finally on Tutors in Gimli. Not being the "fastest" pilot, I moved over to engineering, and was then posted to CFB Clinton.

I married May the day after she finished Nurses Training in 1966 here in Thunder Bay. She practiced her nursing in Goderich and Halifax when I was posted in CFB Clinton, and VX10 respectively.

I resigned from the military in 1970 in order to enter 4 years of training with New Tribes Mission. That was more scary than going to Roads as there was concern as to where the dollars would come from. NTM is a church planting organization that sends missionaries into remote people groups who have no knowledge of the Bible, and generally whose languages are not known.



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Bonard's Story (Continued)

We left for Indonesia in 1974 with our 4 children, and May expecting #5. You, Bob, weren't too far off with the Borneo jungle comment, though our time by the huge Kapuas River was only for one year in 1974/75, while we were studying the Indonesian language. Then we moved to the island of Sulawesi, to the remote coastal town of Tinombo, where we began studying the Lauje tribal language. Many of the people there are bilingual, speaking Indonesian and Lauje.

The Lauje men would come down from the mountains to Tinombo with their trade goods, mainly small red onions. They were poor and often exploited by the traders. We were able to befriend them, and gain their trust. Finally, April 1, 1977, we and our partners, Barrie and Cherri Williamson, moved up into the mountains. Barrie and I had each built a bamboo and wood house up there. Those houses would not serve in Canada but they were comfy, and mansions, I'm afraid, compared to the tribal houses.

It was the highlight of our lives to teach the Lauje people about Jesus Christ, for they had never heard of him. Sickness and death were rampant, and fear of the spirits was a way of life.

It was quite an adventure living with them, treating their diseases, teaching literacy, building airstrips, eventually training medics, and introducing crops and cattle, translating scripture, etc.

They learned God's Word, and their fears subsided. Some 60 of them learned to teach the Truth that sets us free, and now there are several thousand who love and worship Christ in those mountains.

2000 years after Christ was crucified and rose again, unrest in Indonesia brought new adventures. Many of the Christian faith were murdered as the Moslems took over their homes and property. By then our five children had all returned to the USA and Canada, and to our astonishment, all had also joined New Tribes Mission. The oldest 2 and their families were in the more peaceful province of Papua, so when we had to evacuate from Sulawesi we moved temporarily to Papua to work alongside them. They were moving into the very primitive Moi tribe, where killing of wives was common.

Later we moved back to Lauje. Williamsons had evacuated permanently. In 2005, knowing we were named and located by terrorists, we returned to Canada to live with my Mom in Thunder Bay. She had Alzheimers and was living alone in a rural area.

For a while, 4 of our kids were serving in Indonesia, but there has been a shuffling around:

<u>Tim</u> and Kathy live near the NTM Canada headquarters in Durham, On. Tim is now Executive Director there. They have 3 children ages 16, 18, and 20. The oldest, Brandt, will graduate from Bible Institute in Michigan in May. Tyler will graduate from high school . And Alyssa is learning to drive J.

<u>Carolyn</u> and Stephen are still in the very primitive Moi tribe, translating the New Testament into the Moi language and teaching literacy etc. An Indonesian billionaire is planning to build a school and medical clinic on site there. It is only accessible by plane/helicopter. They have 2 girls: Ashley is to graduate in May from Toccoa Falls College in Georgia; Mariah is in nursing at Liberty University in Virginia.

<u>Shane</u> and Karen also live near Durham. Shane teaches in the missions training institute, and Karen is the administrator. They have no children.

Nathan is a computer programmer at NTM USA headquarters in Sanford, Florida.

<u>Alan</u> and Rachel are on home assignment after 4 years in Indonesia. They are staying on the NTM campus in Durham, so 3 of our boys are in close proximity. Alan is busy wiring a new building they are putting up. Rachel teaches in the school for the children of staff and students. They have 2 children: Judah 12, and Miriam 10.

May and I keep busy on our 45 acre hobby farm here in Thunder Bay. A strong back and weak mind (to quote my Dad) is all that's required. The I find my back is not as strong as it used to be.

We've thoroughly enjoyed renewing acquaintance with Matt and Sue Wilson. Matt amazes me with the people and activities he can remember from Roads. Sorry we were unable to get down to the RMC reunion. I was busy getting a well dug 700 feet from our house, since salt from the highway had ruined our well water.

We visited the Lauje tribe again in 2008, and were pleased to see how able the church elders were in taking over spiritual leadership of the 3000+ believers meeting in their various areas across the mountains.
